
DESIGNED AND BUILT BY KATHERINE MOTT IN 1930, THIS Tudor style home remains on Houston's historical registry.

The original plastered walls brought textural interest and substantial depth to the space but were in need of repairs. To counter the effects of repeated paint jobs while still keeping the home's integrity intact, a gypsum-based finish coat, made of the same materials as the original plaster, was applied to the walls throughout the main areas.

By incorporating the modern technology of mixing pigment into plaster, the walls obtain a new dimension and beauty that painted plaster cannot achieve. The finished product enhances the home's woodwork, offering an understated elegance. The floors, honed to appear more subtle, also acquire a new twist.







DIFFERENT CEILING TREATMENTS give the living and dining rooms their own personality while still retaining continuity from space to space. Pulling shades of peach and coral from the rugs and fabrics onto the ceilings grants each room a sense of distinction.
